





EXTENDED CHILD CARE PROGRAM

Our **Extended Child Care Program** offers high-quality early childhood education and child care to children from 6 weeks old -12 years old on a sliding fee scale.

The program operates 24 hours per day, 7 days per week. It serves parents who are working and/or in school.

The goal of this program is to offer affordable, accessible, high-quality care for children and families. This includes providing the best education to young children, in preparation for Kindergarten. We also provide a safe place for our school-aged children before and after school.





OFF SITE CHILD CARE PROGRAMS



As an extension of our main program, Chambliss Center for Children also manages six off-site Early Childhood Education programs throughout the Chattanooga community.

Four of these centers have their own Board of Directors, however, through a management agreement our administrative staff do all of the back office work, and our program staff manage the day-to-day operations of each one.

These centers use the same sliding fee scale and follow the same curriculum as the program on our main campus.




SCHOOL-BASED PROGRAMS

Chambliss Center for Children provides early childhood education and care programs for the children of teachers in Hamilton County Schools. This program has helped reduce turnover rates for new teachers from 49% to under 10% in the schools where our classrooms are located.

RESIDENTIAL SERVICES PROGRAM

Our **Residential Program** cares for children who have been removed from their home due to abuse, abandonment, or neglect and are in the custody of the State of Tennessee. The children and youth reside in our foster homes throughout Hamilton and the surrounding counties.

The goal is to help our young people deal with the past trauma they have experienced and to find them a permanent, loving home. We accomplish this through reunification with the birth family or through an adoptive placement.

Youth who have "aged out" of foster care are able to participate in our Transitional Living Program. This program serves to assist young adults with housing and case management as they work and attend school.




Average Number of Days Spent in our Foster Care Program in 2022:



Cornerstone Time Capsule Opening

Chambliss Center for Children celebrated its 150th Anniversary in 2022. In addition to promoting this milestone anniversary throughout the year, we held two events to commemorate the occasion.

On Tuesday, October 18th, friends of the agency gathered on campus to hear some of the history of the agency and relevance of the milestone anniversary. City of Chattanooga and Hamilton County officials presented proclamations from City Mayor Tim Kelly and Hamilton County Mayor Weston Wamp naming October 29th "Chambliss Center for Children Day" in honor of the day the Board first recorded minutes. Afterwards, we revealed the contents of a time capsule that was originally placed in the cornerstone of the building on December 7, 1937.

Then, on Saturday, October 22nd, community members came together on campus for our 150th AnniversaPARTY. This free, fun celebration included food, music, a Storyland Trail, and activities for the entire family.
